

Housing information

We wanted to share some resources that may be helpful if you are having concerns about your rent or housing security:

- The COVID-19 Eviction & Foreclosure Prevention Act protects tenants from evictions or court dates until after May 1, 2021.
 - If you are worried about an eviction, be sure to submit a hardship declaration before Friday, February 26. After February 26, landlords can start filing for eviction. You can still declare hardship after February 26, but it is more proactive to do it before February 26.
 - To stop any eviction from moving forward until 5/1, fill out the form at this website to submit a hardship declaration form by email to both your landlord and your local courts.
 - All tenants in the state of NY are protected by these laws and have a right to fill out this form, regardless of immigraion status.
- Emergency Rental Assistance Grants: One-Shot Deals are an emergency grant for low-income New Yorkers that can be used for rent payments to avoid an eviction.

 - If your child is a citizen, you should be able to receive a One-Shot Deal regardless of your immigration status, if other eligibility criteria are met.
 - You do not have to go to the NYC Human Resources Administration (HRA)/Department of Social Services in order to apply- Mount Sinai REAP is assisting patients with the online application process. To make an appointment with REAP, please call EHHOP at 877-372-4161 or call the REAP office at 212-423-2800 Monday-Friday, 9am-5pm.
 - NYC HRA does not require you to have a case in Housing Court to receive a One-Shot Deal.
 - You do not have to receive Public Assistance to apply for a One-Shot Deal.
- Through the Immigrant Emergency Relief Program, community-based organizations are distributing one-time emergency relief to immigrant New Yorkers who have been affected by the coronavirus pandemic.
 - Please call the NYC Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs hotline (212) 788-7654 for more information, and to be referred to one of the organizations in your community who is distributing the funds.
 - o If an advocate is calling, you must also be on the call.

COVID-19 Vaccination

- As of February 15, 2021, the following groups of patients are eligible for vaccines: (1) 65 years old and older; (2) Workers in certain positions (medical profession, restaurant/grocery store, food delivery, public transportation) are also eligible; and (3) 18 years old and older with pre-existing medical conditions (diabetes, high blood pressure, asthma, and others).
- Unfortunately vaccines are not available in EHHOP Clinic at this time. In order to receive a COVID-19 vaccine, you must schedule an appointment at a public vaccination center or a local pharmacy. Vaccine scheduling is very difficult in New York at this time, with many more eligible patients than available doses. To schedule your vaccine, please use this website or this website. If you are having difficulty scheduling your appointment, please contact EHHOP for assistance.
- EHHOP can provide transportation to and from vaccine appointments if needed. Contact EHHOP to arrange this service if needed.
- As of February 15, 2021 the following documents are required at vaccine appointments:
 - o Identification: NYCID, passport (any country), or birth certificate
 - Proof of address: can be lease, piece of mail, bill, etc.
 - Proof of employment (if eligible solely based on job): letter from employer, paycheck, etc
 - Proof of medical condition (if eligible solely based on pre-existing condition): letter from doctor stating medical condition
 - Please contact EHHOP if you need assistance with any of the above documents, particularly if you are in need of a letter to document your medical condition.
- EHHOP highly recommends vaccination to all of our eligible patients. For more information about the vaccine (including its safety and efficacy), see here.
- Please contact EHHOP with any questions or concerns regarding the COVID-19 vaccine. Questions may pertain to eligibility, assistance with scheduling, documentation of medical condition, or discussion of safety. Please leave us a message at 877-372-4161 and someone will return your call within 24 hours.
